Caribou Sign-On Letters

Anyone who's visited us this summer has heard about our Caribou Sign-On Letters. For those of you who haven't, the BC government is currently considering a plan to kill wolves in BC in the name of caribou conservation. Though the mountain caribou is in fact threatened and declining, there is a growing body of evidence that indicates killing wolves will not help to protect the caribou. A number of scientific and environmental organizations have already sent a letter to the government stating these facts and their opposition to the planned kill. Since then, a similar letter has been created for public use by the Animal Alliance of Canada and we made it available for our visitors to sign so that we can collect and send them to the government as well. We are pleased to announce that we have collected over 3,800 signed letters and will continue to collect more, at least until we reach our goal of 5000 letters. We are also aware that other groups and individuals have collected and sent more letters independently. If you haven't signed a letter yet you can find a copy on our website. You can mail it directly to the government (address on letterhead) or send it to us so that we can include it in our tally. We'd like to send out a great howl of appreciation to everyone who has supported this campaign!

Conservation Corner **MOUNTAIN CARIBOU UPDATE**

On September 16th, we met with Columbia River-Revelstoke MLA Norm Macdonald for the second time to discuss BC government wolf control programs in the name of mountain caribou recovery. Mr. Macdonald will be hand-delivering the sign-on letters we have collected from visitors over the summer to BC environment minister Barry Penner, and REVISITING the issue of Karelian Bear dogs for wildlife shepherding too. The sign-on letters have accumulated. As of September 11th, signees included:

We have started a new initiative for people to offset their own carbon footprint by having US plant a tree! 

How often can you say that your job changed who you are?

I can honestly say that the Northern Light Wildlife Wolf Centre has done exactly that. When I started working here in the summer of 2009, I knew very little, if anything, about wolves and nature in general. However this experience has opened my eyes to an entirely different world of balance and responsibility. At this day in age, near the pinnacle of our technological advancements, we have forgotten who we are and where we came from. We forgot that we are as much a part of nature as the flora and fauna that surround us. This facility has grounded me to the fact that we are above nothing and protecting nature is the only road to recovery.

Recommended Reading

There's nothing like cozying up with a good book on a cold and stormy day. If you're looking for a good read we highly recommend "The Grizzly Manifesto" by Jeff Gailus. Focusing on the Grizzly Bear, Gailus exposes the twisted interrelationship between policy, politics and wildlife management, and sheds light as to why our species often don't have the protection they deserve, and why science and knowledge aren't the driving forces they should be in management decisions. Using sharp criticisms such as "Canada's lack of progress in legally protecting species at risk is an international embarrassment", Gailus holds nothing back. He also emphasizes how important it is that we vote, something Casey Black has long expressed. As written in the book: "It's easy enough to blame governments [...] but ultimately it's not just them who are failing us. We are failing ourselves. The only way to turn things around in Canada is to begin paying attention to the environmental politics that whirl around us like snowflakes in an East Coast storm. We must incorporate these politics into the way we live our lives and especially into the way we vote. [...] Our governments are beholden to corporate interests, and they have become unresponsive and unaccountable beasts."
